Statement of Purpose



The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child

Article 3 The best interests of the child must be a top priority in all decisions and actions that affect children.

Article 5 (parental guidance and a child's evolving capacities) Governments must respect the rights and responsibilities of parents and carers to provide guidance and direction to their child as they grow up, so that they fully enjoy their rights. This must be done in a way that recognises the child's increasing capacity to make their own choices.

Article 12 (respect for the views of the child) Every child has the right to express their views, feelings and wishes in all matters affecting them, and to have their views considered and taken seriously.

Article 29 (education and children's development) Education should help develop every child's personality, talents and mental and physical abilities to the full. It should develop children's respect for their own rights and those of others, for their parents, for their own culture and the cultures

Statement of Purpose

At Dunoon Primary ELC we recognise that working in partnership with parents/carers is of major value and importance in enabling us to provide a happy, caring and stable environment for children and their parents. We aim to form a good relationship with parents so that information regarding their children (be it developmental, social or health related) can be exchanged easily and comfortably by Dunoon Primary School ELC staff and parents/carers.

"Parents/carers are the first and most influential educators of their children. It is important that staff across all early years settings recognise the interest and experiences children bring from home and use these as a starting point to extend learning". (CfE, Building the Curriculum 2)

Consistency of Approach

The list below shows ways in which Dunoon Primary School ELC will try to achieve a strong working partnership with parents:

- Dunoon Primary School Head Teacher, Principal Teacher and ELC staff are always available for discussion with parents. Parents/carers can contact us on <u>01631 704159</u> or <u>enquiries-dunoon@argyll-bute.gov.uk</u> where arrangements can be made for more private discussions at agreed times if required.
- Information provided by parents/carers about their children will be kept confidential and treated on a strict need to know basis.

- Dunoon Primary School ELC staff will share information with parents regarding activities their child has taken part in by verbal communication, observation books or on SeeSaw.
- Parents/carers are encouraged to share learning and achievements from out-with Dunoon Primary School ELC, contributing to their child's Personal Learning Journal on SeeSaw.
- Plans for learning opportunities initiated by the interests and developmental needs
 of the children in Dunoon Primary School ELC will be recorded in the children's
 "floor book", this can be seen by parents and will be on show in the ELC for
 parents/carers to view/read.
- Dunoon Primary School shares regular newsletters these are issued to keep parents/carers up to date with information about the nursery, e.g. nursery news, new developments or staff changes.
- If staff from Dunoon Primary School ELC have any concerns about a child's wellbeing during the day, every effort will be made to contact the parents/carers or their emergency contact.
- Dunoon Primary School ELC will where possible, further encourage the children's development, by engaging with parents/carers and asked to send in objects from home, e.g. photographs, old boxes and cartons, materials to support current interests and learning.
- Parents/carers are requested to keep Dunoon Primary School ELC staff informed of any changes to personal circumstances which may influence a child, e.g., change of address, telephone number, doctor, emergency contact.
- Parents/carers are also requested to keep Dunoon Primary School ELC staff
 informed of any circumstances which could influence a child's emotional well-being,
 e.g., bereavement, separation or illness in the family.
- Your child's keyworker will share information regarding your child's journey at nursery with your child and your family from entry to ELC and where possible, throughout their time in Dunoon Primary School ELC.
- Dunoon Primary School will offer regular contact times, for the parents/carers, child and keyworker to collaborate before each child starts at their induction and throughout the year.
- Informal contact with the keyworker/parent happens daily.
- Parents/carers are welcome to stay and play with their child, this should be organised with ELC staff.
- Open sessions are held throughout the year.
- Formal Parent Chats are organised in order for parents/carers, children and ELC staff to talk about each child's progress and next steps in learning.
- Parents/carers are encouraged to become involved in the general life of Dunoon Primary School ELC as well as special organised events such as; Christmas Sing-alongs, Sponsored Walks, Easter Egg Hunts and Sports Day.
- Dunoon Primary School ELC staff will work in partnership ensuring parents have opportunities to become familiar with relevant curriculums, pedagogy's and information. Facilitating workshops if applicable and relevant.
- Dunoon Primary School ELC shares its' policies, all policies are available online.
 Dunoon Primary School will collaborate with Parents and children where possible in the development of their policies.

"Parents and carers know and understand their child best. As the child's first educators, parents and carers are key partners in supporting their child's learning. As pedagogical leaders, it is essential that we develop positive relationships with parents and carers and work closely alongside them and value their contribution. Understanding the complexities, diversities and cultural differences of individual families and how this can impact each child is essential. The conversations we have with each family form the foundations of our relationships with them. During these conversations it is essential that we respect, understand and empathise to ensure our relationships are built on trust." (Realising the Ambition – Being Me)

"We recognise that parents are the primary caregivers and influence in a child's life, and that a high-quality home learning environment is important for the child.

We know that the home learning environment continues to be the most influential for children. However, the expansion (of 1140) particularly when delivered alongside other family support, provides a real opportunity to strengthen the foundations of a child's early learning journey." (A Blueprint for 2020: The Expansion of Early Learning & Childcare in Scotland)

"Family learning is a partnership approach which can lead to positive outcomes for both adults and children. It can be used as an early intervention and prevention approach which reaches the most disadvantaged communities. Family learning helps close the attainment gap through breaking inter-generational cycles of deprivation and low attainment. The effects of family learning are known to extend beyond the duration of the intervention and provide lasting impacts and improved outcomes (Family Learning Review, 2016)." (Realising the Ambition – Being Me)

At Dunoon Primary School ELC, we promote family learning by offering a range of opportunities such as:

- Book Bug sessions
- Parent Information Sessions
- Stay and Play sessions
- Family Fun Activities

These family learning programmes change regularly in response to the needs and wishes of the parents and children.
